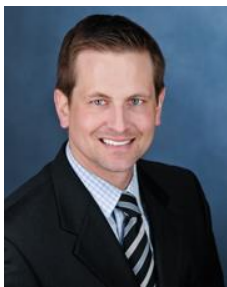
**Required: Jennifer Brockman “Sexual Harassment Education”
Tuesday, June 5th, 3:30 p.m.**

Jen Brockman joined the University of Kansas community in the Spring of 2016 as the director of the newly formed Sexual Assault Prevention and Education Center. She has worked since 2001 in the field of victim advocacy and prevention in three different states at community programs, flagship institutes, and state coalitions. She received a Bachelor of Arts in 2003 from Drury University in Criminology and Sociology and a Masters of Arts in Organizational Leadership in 2009 from Gonzaga University.



**Required: Mary Banwart - “Woman and Society”
Wednesday, June 6th, 3:45 p.m.**

Dr. Banwart's primary research focuses on political campaign communication and the influence of gender in political campaigns, with specific attention directed toward political advertising, campaign web sites, and mixed-gender debates. She has authored book chapters and journal articles examining the strategic use of advertising in political campaigns, gendered uses of communication on campaign web sites, the gender gap, and news coverage in mixed-gender races. She co-authored the book, *Gender and Political Candidate Communication: VideoStyle, WebStyle, and NewsStyle*. Dr. Banwart was a co-recipient of the 2003 Central States Communication Association Federation Prize for research analyzing gender in U.S. Senate, House, and gubernatorial mixed-gender debates, and a co-recipient of the 2000 Carrie Chapman Catt Prize for Research on Women and Politics. Dr. Banwart coordinates the University's interdisciplinary Leadership Studies Minor, and teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in political communication as well as leadership and communication.



**Required: Steve Allton “Students’ rights as non-US Citizens”

Steve Allton is an attorney licensed to practice in Kansas since 2004. Within the state, Mr. Allton has worked as a research attorney to a Kansas Supreme Court justice and as an assistant attorney general representing state agencies and officials in administrative matters and all aspects of litigation. Currently, he works as a staff attorney for Legal Services for Students at the University of Kansas. In this role, Mr. Allton counsels, educates, and provides legal assistance to students on a wide variety of legal issues including international and domestic tax, landlord/tenant, consumer, and criminal matters. In addition to his law degree, Mr. Allton also has bachelor degrees in music education, psychology, and human development, as well as a recent master’s degree in public administration from KU.



**Elizabeth Asiedu “US Economic Institutions and Structures”
Thursday, June 21st, 9:00 a.m.**

Elizabeth Asiedu is a Professor of Economics at the University of Kansas. She was Associate Chair and the Director of Graduate Studies of the Economics Department from 2007-2009. She is also the President and founder of the Association for the Advancement of African Women Economists (AAWE), editor of the Journal of African Development (JAD) and former President of the African Finance Economic Association (AFEA). Dr. Asiedu received her B.S. (Hons) in Computer Science and Math from the

University of Ghana, M.S. in Mathematics from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC), and PhD in Economics also from UIUC.

Dr. Asiedu’s research focuses on Foreign Direct Investment, Foreign Aid and Gender. Her research has received both national and international prominence. In 2007, she was one of ten recipients of Emerging Scholar Award - a nation-wide award that honors minority faculty in the US. Her work has been published in leading scholarly journals, including The American Economic Review Papers and Proceedings, Economic Theory, Journal of International Economics, and The Review of Economics and Statistics. Her work is also cited in several international publications, including The Report of the Commission for Africa (The Tony Blair Report) presented at the G8 Summit in 2005. She has consulted for many international organizations, including The United Nations University/World Institute of Development Economics Research (UNU-WIDER), International Labor Organization (ILO), The African Development Bank and The Global Development Network.



**Mike Wuthrich “US Culture, Values and Expressions”
Friday June 22nd, 1:00 p.m.**

Mike Wuthrich is an Assistant Professor in Political Science and the Undergraduate Studies Director for Global & International Studies. He received his PhD in Political Science from Bilkent University in Ankara, Turkey in 2011. His interests are Middle East politics, particularly Turkish, Kurdish, and Iranian politics, parties and party systems, electoral behavior, religion, and nationalism. His publications have appeared in the *International*

Journal of Middle East Studies, *the Middle East Journal*, *Southeast European and Black Sea Studies*, and *Turkish Studies*. His book, *National Elections in Turkey: People, Politics, and the Party System* came out in July 2015 with Syracuse University Press.



**Mark Josslyn “US Government Systems”
Thursday, June 28th, 9:00 a.m.**

Broadly, I study attitude formation and change. How are political attitudes formed and under what conditions may we expect change? I draw from cognitive and motivational theories, recognizing the value of both to understanding the complexities of the political mind. Recently, I have devoted considerable time to examining the determinants of causal attributions.

Specifically, what are the individual and contextual factors that influence the public’s causal attributions? Hotly debated attributions such as the causes of mass shootings, obesity, homosexuality, wealth and success are the present focus of my research.



**Rosemary O'Leary “Public Policy and Public Administration”
Friday, June 29th, 1:00 p.m.**

Rosemary O'Leary was appointed the Edwin O. Stene Distinguished Professor of Public Administration at the University of Kansas in 2013, following a 24 year career at the Maxwell School of Syracuse University (Phanstiel Distinguished Chair in Strategic Management and Leadership) and the School of Public and Environmental Affairs at Indiana University-Bloomington (Professor). O'Leary is the author or editor of twelve books and more than 125 articles and book chapters on public management. She was the creator and coordinator of the Minnowbrook III conferences (2008) which assessed the future of public administration around the world. She has won twelve national research awards and ten teaching awards. In 2017 she won the Provan Award for “Outstanding Empirical Theory” given by the Academy of Management, the Frederickson Award for “Lifetime Achievement and Continuous Contributions to Public Management Research over an extended career” given by the Public Management Research Association (PMRA) and the Routledge Award for “Outstanding Contributions to Public Management Research” given by the International Research Society for Public Management (IRSPM). An elected member of the National Academy of Public Administration, O'Leary was a senior Fulbright scholar in Malaysia (1998-99) and in the Philippines (2005-06). In 2014 she was an Ian Axford Public Policy Scholar in New Zealand.

Deputy Chief James Anguiano is a 30-year veteran in law enforcement with 28 years working for The University of Kansas Public Safety Office. He is a graduate of Highland Park High School in Topeka, Kansas and The Topeka Police Academy.

He is a member of the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Association. He is an FBI-LEEDA Trilogy Award Recipient in Leadership. Deputy Chief Anguiano oversees the Support Services Unit of the University of Kansas Police Division.



Chuck Marsh “US Media and the Distribution of News”

Charles Marsh is the Oscar Stauffer Professor of Journalism and Mass Communications at the University of Kansas. His primary areas of research involve public relations, ethics and classical rhetoric. His research has appeared in *Public Relations Inquiry*, *Journal of Public Relations Research*, *Public Relations Review*, *Journalism and Mass Communication Quarterly*, *Journal of Mass Media Ethics* and other journals. He is the author of *Classical Rhetoric and Modern Public Relations: An Isocratean Model* and co-author of the textbooks *Public Relations: A Values-Driven Approach* and *Strategic Writing: Multimedia*

Writing for Public Relations, Advertising and More.

His current research interests involve examining the “fully functioning society theory” of public relations. Pioneered by Robert L. Heath, that theory holds that a core function of public relations involves working to build humane and effective societies. Toward that end, he is examining public relations through the lenses of evolutionary biology, social justice and classical rhetoric.
